In Community of Music Makers workshops, Bay Area amateur musicians gather on our stage and join in the pleasure of making music while honing their skills working with the Symphony's artistic staff. In our chamber music workshops, participants are musicians who are already working together in chamber music ensembles. Groups select repertory and are paired with San Francisco Symphony musicians who coach them privately. All the groups come together on the Davies Symphony Hall stage to play for one another.

Today's chamber music concert featured the artistry of SFS musicians playing some of the world's greatest repertory. We invite you to imagine the longstanding chamber music tradition of playing for one another in the living rooms, salons, and small gatherings where this music was premiered and performed for the enjoyment of all. Our chamber music workshop participants are part of that tradition, as they explore chamber music with Symphony mentors and share their music making with one another.

Symphony Mentors

David Henderson holds degrees from the University of Michigan and Juilliard School, and received a first prize in saxophone from the Bordeaux Conservatory. He works regularly as an orchestral saxophonist with the SFS, and with the San Francisco Opera and Ballet. He has performed with orchestras from across the country and around the world, and has appeared as soloist with the Oakland East Bay Symphony and Bay Area Rainbow Symphony. For nearly twenty years he was a member of the San Francisco Saxophone Quartet, and since 2006 he has played with the Premiere Saxophone Quartet, formerly artists-in-residence at San Jose State University.

James Moore performs with the San Francisco Ballet and Opera orchestras and frequently appears with the SFS. He was appointed to the San Francisco Conservatory of Music faculty in 2000 as Professor of Oboe and Chamber Music and has chaired the Wind Department since 2012. In addition to his work at the Conservatory, he is a coach for the SFS Youth Orchestra. He has also taught at the Oberlin Conservatory and the Aspen School of Music. Mr. Moore received degrees from Oberlin College and Conservatory of Music and the San Francisco Conservatory. He has performed for the national touring productions of Ragtime, Aida, James Joyce's The Dead, Beauty and the Beast, and Fiddler on the Roof, as well as the world premiere of Wicked. His teachers were James Caldwell and John de Lancie.


Florin Parvulescu, a native of Romania, joined the SFS in 1998. He holds degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of Music and the Juilliard Preparatory Division. He was previously a member of the Saint Louis Symphony and Baltimore Symphony, won the 1993 Marbury Competition at the Peabody Conservatory, and was a prizewinner in the 1994 Yale Gordon Concerto Competition. Mr. Parvulescu has appeared in festivals such as Aspen, Victoria International Festival, and the École d'Arts Américaines in Fontainebleau, France. He also attended the American Academy of Conducting at the Aspen Music Festival.

Jerome Simas, who joined the SFS in 2012, was a fellow at the New World Symphony and has held principal clarinet positions with such ensembles as the California Symphony, Oakland East Bay Symphony, and Akron Symphony. He is a member of San Francisco's Left Coast Chamber Ensemble. He received degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he studied with Franklin Cohen, and he also studied and performed chamber music at Marlboro. First prize winner of the International Clarinet Society Young Artist Competition and grand prize winner at the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition, Mr. Simas has taught at UC Davis, Stanford, the San Francisco Conservatory, and the University of Oregon.
